The next reunion, under the guidance of Vice President Charles H. Fulghum, Sr., of Pascagoula, MS, will be June 25, 26 and 27 at Starkville, MS, The Golden Triangle of North East Mississippi.

On March 22 we had a distinguished luncheon guest. Our Family cousin, Robert Lee "Kindergarten" Fulghum, drove down from Savannah for a visit. He was on his Eastern Tour of Lectures. Robert has just finished his fourth book, whose title is "Maybe Yes - Maybe No". We had a great visit. He has just signed a contract with the publisher for two more books. Robert wished to be remembered to all of his Family cousins and regretted that he could not be at the Family Reunion this year.

Congratulations and all best wishes to our cousin Tommy Fulghum of Wadley and Augusta, GA for his beginning of his 50th chip mill. The project is now being designed for Brazil's Amapa Florestal E. Cellulose S/A (AMCEL) and is the Fulghum Industries third off-shore chip mill.

Jabo Fulghum was a noted baseball catcher and designated hitter at Louisburg College, NC, May 1982. He made All-Eastern Tarheel Conference and was Louisburg's "Student Athlete of the Year 1982". Jabo was with the ECU Pirates, March 1983. WHERE IS JABO NOW??

A recent letter from Ms. Kimberly Smith, Curator, The Colonial Williamsburg, wished information about the family of Sella Fulgham. Sella had made a needlework sampler in 1761, at Isle of Wight, VA. Sella's sampler is one of the earliest known Virginia pieces of school girl embroidery and was passed down in the family and donated to the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation by the Cofer family.

Who was Sella? She was the daughter of one of the early Fulgham families who must have been born c 1743. Well, over 350 years and among 4000 names in our data base, we have not been able to find Sella Fulgham. Sorry, Ms. Smith. Better luck next time.

As you have been told, the early Fulghams of the Isle of Wight County, VA, were granted land acreage for transporting persons from England to the Virginia colony. The following records are from Passenger and Immigration List-Index, First Edition - edited by Wm Filey - copy.

Robert Thomas, Senr. - 6 Nov 1705 (page 691) transported 20 persons. Elizabeth Fulgham was among the 20 persons. Essex Co., NC. Who was this Elizabeth Fulgham?

<u>Capt. Anthony Fulgham</u>, June 1664 - Granted 1000 acres, Isle of Wight for transporting 20 persons. Among them were sons John and Anthony.

<u>Capt. Anthony Fulgham</u>, 12 July 1665 - Granted 1600 acres, Isle of Wight for transporting 30 persons. Included were sons John and Anthony.

Anthony Fulgham, 5 Sept 1650 - Granted 500 acres of land, northside Rapph River for transportation of 10 persons.

Nicholas Fulgham, 2 May 1706 - Granted 380 acres, Isle of Wight for transportation of 8 persons.

As noted above Captain Anthony included John and Anthony in June 1664 and again in July 1665.

According to the General Assembly of Virginia (1619-1976) there were two Fulghams who served in the Virginia House of Delegates. Both were from Wight County, Virginia. Charles Fulgham, son of Nicholas Fulgham was a delegate to the Convention 1776, 1777 and 1778. Charles was very active in the affairs of the county and state. June 5, 1777, the court ordered that Charles Fulgham be appointed a Captain of the Militia in Isle of Wight County. He no doubt participated in helping to write the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution for the United States of America. The second member of the House was Robert L. Fulgham, 1813 and 1814.

From the Official British Court Records we learn that from 1614 to 1775 some 50,000 English men, women and children were deported to the American Colonies for crimes ranging from the theft of a handkerchief, to bigamy, to highway robbery. This forced immigration to the Americas consisted of felons, vagabonds, beggars and other undesirables. Many of these persons were assigned to labor in the tobacco fields of Virginia and Maryland. There were no Foljambes or Fulghams in this large group of immigrants.

The spelling of the Fulgham/Fulghum name has varied many ways over the past 500 years, as we know. The below is a most unique spelling of our name and I quote ...
[Will of Anthony ffulgeham: Land I now live on to bro. Nicholas ffulgeham; bro. Michaill ffulgeham; bro. John's son, Anthony; Kinswoman Martha Fulgeham, dau. to bro. Michaill. Dated 14 Oct., 1678;]

The recent Fulgham/Fulghum National Family Reunion gave us pause to honor and pay tribute to our beloved ancestors who helped to carve this great nation 130 years before the Declaration of Independence was signed.

We have just celebrated another July 4th and again felt proud to wave the flag and rejoice to bear the ancient and honorable name of Foljambe, or Fulgham or Fulghum. So teach your children and your grandchildren that "A good name is rather to be chosen than great riches".

HISTORY OF JOSEPH FULGHAM

Joseph Fulgham, son of Nicholas, son of Capt. Anthony, moved from Isle of Wight County, Virginia to Plymouth, Massachusetts prior to 1744. Plymouth Church records show that he married Rebeckah Young on 1 March 1744. "He was master of the ship "COMMERCE" engaged in the merchant trade between England, the West Indies, and lost coast ports." * Joseph had only one son that lived by this marriage, Charles, born 18 June 1749. By 1752 Joseph had bought the third house on Market Street from the corner of Market and Leyden for we find: "... in 1749 Mr. Shurtleff sold (the store) to John Watson, who sold it, in 1752, to Joseph Fulgham. In 1779 the administrators of Mr. Fulgham sold it to Robert Brown....It was later occupied by Benjamin Cooper Finnly as a store, and in 1883 was removed to the rear of the Brewster Building on Leyden Street, where it has been used as a dwelling house with its old front room restored."** Rebeckah died sometime prior to 1753 for we find that by 1753 Joseph had married twice into the family descendants of Thomas Clark who came over on the "ANN" in 1623.

It is interesting to note that the former owner of the storefront purchased by Capt. Joseph in 1752 was a Shurtleff and Abiel Shurtleff became his brother-in-law when Joseph married Luraina Clark in 1753. Both Shurtleff and Watson were involved in maritime activities. It would be interesting to

explore down Leyden Street and find if a dwelling house to the rear of the Brewster Building still exists.

I would like to know the English origin of the Thomas Clark who came over to Plymouth in the "ANN" in 1623. I know that the "ANN" passengers came to Plymouth from Leyden, Netherlands but I would like to know where Thomas Clark's house was in England. If any of our FFFA members know or can find out I would appreciate it.

A lady back in the 1830's decided to invest a few thousand dollars to insure that the congregation would not die out. Today, those dollars have grown to a million dollars and the interest generated each year is in excess of 87 thousand dollars.

As I thought about the Fulgham/Fulghum Family I said, "Why couldn't we do something like this for our heirs?" Imagine two or three hundred years from now all sorts of Fulgham/Fulghum children might be able to further their education from scholarships that would go on and on. Our Family could be a most educated group and a great influence on our nation in many diverse ways. We are a small Family in a large country, but a very special Family of great talent and mutiple gifts. We should further our cause.

At the Family Reunion in Palestine, Texas, I shared this idea with the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee.

They agreed and brought it to the Assembly who voted to begin a fund for educational purposes. A committee was chosen to study the idea and to look into the possibilities of a foundation or endowment for the future. Peggy Wood has opened a separate account, and is waiting for the committee to act and the Family to implement it. Some day we may have young Fulgham/Fulghums coming to our Reunion telling us how the "Foundation" has helped them reach their dreams and to better the world.

B.E. (GENE) FULGHUM, 82 - A former City High School teacher and athletic coach of Memphis, died on March 5, 1992, at St. Francis Hospital He loved his family and athletics. He attended the Family Reunion at Wadley, GA.

ALBERT SIDNEY FULGHUM - Of Memphis, TN, died Oct. 20, 1991 after several years of ill health. Albert attended the first Family Reunion at Rock Ridge, NC. He was the brother of cousin George D. Fulghum of Memphis, TN.

PAULINE WOOD FULGHUM, 95 - Of Jacksonville, FL, died July 3, 1992. She was the wife of Willis G. Fulghum, deceased.

James Marshall was a friend of the Family and was proud of his Fulghum heritage. He will be missed by all of us. James Marshall was a genealogist and provided much valuable Family history.

CHARLIE POWELL- Of Anderson, SC died unexpectedly in February 1992. Charlie was the son of Minnie Fulghum Powell, deceased and the grandson of Miles Henry Fulghum. He leaves his wife and a daughter.

SARA MAE BAILEY FULGHUM - Of Lavonia, GA died February 1992 following several years of declining health. She was the wife of Alton Eugene Fulghum. Alton is the son of Robert Verner Fulghum, grandson of Miles Henry Fulghum. Sara leaves her husband, three children and 12 grandchildren.

DARLENE JONES SINGLETON, 42 - Of Lithonia, GA died February 1992 following a two year battle with cancer. Darlene was the daughter of Alton Jones and Geneva Fulghum Jones. Geneva is the daughter of Robert Verner Fulghum and granddaughter of Miles Henry Fulghum. Darlene leaves her husband and a daughter.

DID YOU KNOW . . .

That Fulgh'm's are listed in the census as Fulgham, Fulghum, Fulgam, Fulgam, Fulgam, Fulgen, Fulgrim, Fulgam, Fulghume, Fulguim, Fulguimn, Fulguirf, Fulghram, Fulgiam, Fulgam, Fulgam

That Jesse Mercer Fulghum, eldest son of John Glen Fulghum, married Mary Dortch and had a son named Hermes. Mary died in 1868 during childbirth and Hermes was raised by his uncle Jacob Alonzo. Hermes died in 1885. Jesse Mercer left Washington County Georgia, studied for the ministry, became a preacher in Tennessee, participated in genealogy and found that the name started as Fulgham. Changed to Fulgham, married Clementine Walton Thornton and raised a Tennessee Fulgham family of three boys. Jesse Mercer is the only Fulgh'm recorded to have two families, one a "Hum" and the other a "Ham".

That a family reunion was being held in Portland, Oregon at the same time as the Annual Reunion in Palestine, Texas. They had about 75 and 5 generations represented. Over 250 Fulgh'ms together on the same weekend. Isn't that great! Attend a reunion when possible - it's fun.

That George F. Fulgham was in Monterey County, California and Raymond Fulgham was in Tulare County, California before 1860.

That when Winnefred Pierce Fulgham, wife of Raiford, died her youngest daughter Apsilla was the subject of a court petition to declare her an "idiot". In 1833 the Sheriff of Wayne county was ordered to find twelve "honest" men and examine the said Apsilla. He obeyed his orders and reported to the court that Apsilla was indeed an "idiot", signed and attested to by 12 men of the community. A guardian would have to be appointed to control her shares of the estate, some land and 8 slaves. In 1840 Apsilla is in Nacogdoches County Texas as a head of household with her 8 slaves. Her brother Arthur and his son Pierce are also in the county. Apparently Arthur was appointed her guardian.

That the Georgia land lottery of 1805 had lots of Fulgh'm participation with Stephen and Ephraim in Elbert County; Hardy in Burke County; Jesse and Micajah in Washington County; also Henry and Thomas in Montgomery County. All are over 21 years of age and had been in Georgia over one year. Only Jesse was unmarried at the time. John, Stephen and Matthew had received grants 1790 to 1795 that were headright and bounty grants. Hardy, Jesse, Henry and Micajah were sons of John and Mary Montgomery Fulgham who died in Montgomery County, Georgia in 1801. The fathers of Ephraim and Thomas are unknown at this time. We are still searching.
