### Judson Davis Fulghum

1929 - 1999

Judson D. Fulghum was born 11 September 1929 in Aiken, South Carolina. He died after a heroic battle with cancer on 9 September 1999. His father was Paul Fulghum and his mother was Addie Belle (Franklin) Sizemore Fulghum. Judson's Grandfather was Jacob Alonza Fulghum, who discovered and developed "Fulghum," an American variety of rust resistant red oats. Judson has two brothers, James Paul Fulghum and Kenneth Wilbur Fulghum.

Judson grew up in the Aiken, SC area. He joined the U.S. Navy 2 October 1946 and worked in the area of Aviation Electronics Maintenance. In 1958 Judson was commissioned as Ensign. He retired from the Navy in 1969 as a Lieutenant Commander after 23 years of service. He served in the Berlin Airlift, Korean Conflict, Lebanon Crisis, Cuban Crisis, and Vietnam. He was a member of Air Groups aboard such notable ships as the USS Intrepid, USS Saratoga, USS Forestal, USS Roosevelt, and USS Coral Sea. In addition, he served in Anti-Submarine Patrol Squadron 45. His

last duty was as a Contracting Officer at the Naval Engineering Service Unit in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

While stationed at Moffett Field, California Judson met and married Dorothy Jean Dunnivant 7 February 1952. From this union, four children were born: Julie Ann Fulghum Jones, born 23 December 1952; Paul Austin Fulghum, born 3 February 1955; Laura Lynn Fulghum Adler Whitaker, born 10 November 1956; and Douglas Andrew Fulghum, born 2 December 1959. Dorothy Jean died February 2, 1993 in Tulsa, OK.

### FAMILY ARCHIVES NEWS

**Help!** We are STILL looking for a notebook that was (?) Misplaced (?), lost (?), or lent to someone at the 1997 Reunion at Rock Ridge, NC. It was a hand written genealogy and history of the Uehara Family, and it contained pictures of Lillian U. Yelton and Anne U. Kobayashi. I would greatly appreciate learning its whereabouts and will pay the postage and costs to have it returned.

Unfortunately, the CD we obtained containing many of the vital records of the British Isles dating from 1538 to 1888 was no help in finding leads to Captain Anthony's parentage. I have learned from Grant Fulgham that other similar more extensive sources are available. So far, there is no real information on Captain Anthony's parentage. The information that lead some to believe he was the son of Hercules Foljambe came from John Bennett Boddie in his book, *Historical Southern Families, v III*, Genealogical Publishing Company, Baltimore 1967, pp 86-93. The information Boddie published was from information supplied by John Poindexter Landers. The information was speculative, and based on conversations Landers had with Foljambes in England. (Letter to James H. Fulghum from J.P. Landers, dated April 29, 1959.) Boddie rushed the information into print without checking it or furnishing references -- or even giving Landers credit for his work. See also FFFF #27, page 4.

found that some of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints data is correct. Perhaps I can download all of their data and start from there.

### How to Apply for Membership in the Sons of the American Revolution

James E. Fulghum, M.D. and Jacolyn Fulghum

"Application for membership in the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) is made on standard forms furnished by the state societies. These forms call for the place and date of birth and death of the Patriot ancestor and the names and dates of birth, of marriages, and death of ancestors in intervening generations. Applications may be obtained from the registrar of the local or state SAR chapter. Each step - generation - must be documented with copies of marriage

certificates, wills, death certificates, etc. Each generation must be bloodline from the Patriot. One must have a sponsor who is a member of the local or state SAR chapter.

Our research was done at the local Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, the Genealogy Library in Raleigh, North Carolina, the library in Jacksonville and in my own collection of birth certificates, death certificates and wills. When the application is complete, it must be

sent back to the registrar along with separate dues and application checks to local, state, and national SAR.

## FULGHAM-FULGHUM FAMILY COMPUTER DATABASE

The 1998 version of the Fulgham-Fulghum Family Archived Computer Database was available on 3.5 inch diskettes. A later version, which was in preparation by Judson D. Fulghum before his death in September, was being prepared to be available on 100 MB ZIP disks. At this writing, we do not have the new version. The 1998 version may be available from our Secretary-Treasurer, Peggy Fulghum Wood (see page 2 for contact information). The 1998 version is in the *dBase III+* program and can be imported into most DOS based database programs. This version of the database is on three diskettes. The first is the genealogical database containing 10,000 names descending from Captain Anthony Fulgham, the first settler who arrived in Virginia ca. 1640. The Narrative database contains biological information on all Fulgh-m families included in the database and is on a second diskette. The third diskette is a Census based diskette of all of the Fulgh-ms living in the United States down through the Census of 1920. Directions for using the database and diskettes are included. Currently, the price of each of these diskettes is \$50 or \$150 for the set of three.

## Hurricanes and Floods Ravage Eastern North Carolina

Hurricanes Dennis, Floyd, and Irene, as well as some heavy cold front rains, have caused great flooding of eastern North Carolina and adjacent areas. First, Dennis saturated the soil with over 4 inches of rain. Later, Floyd dropped over 20 inches of rain on eastern NC within two days. Intervening cold front rains, at least one dropping several inches of rain, followed by Irene with 4 inches of rain in Greenville, NC (up to 10 inches in other areas) caused sustained flooding of the lowlands of NC. For example, the Tar River at Greenville overflowed its banks on September 11 and did not recede below flood stage until after October 10; then rose again several feet above flood stage following the rains of Irene. Other rivers in NC were above flood stage for longer periods. The Neuse River was still flooding at this writing (October 28). The Tar River floods at 13 feet above an agreed upon measuring point. At the crest of the flood, it was at 30 feet. Only by heroic efforts of Greenville employees were the water and electricity plants kept in operation by as both these facilities are in the flood plain.

The damage is unimaginable and the misery to humans and domestic animals is truly heart-rending. Over 18,000 SQUARE MILES of land in eastern NC was flooded. The floods greatly exceeded the "100 year flood" estimates. In many areas the water came up so fast, people were trapped in their homes. Many were rescued by boats and by helicopters. One family was found trapped in their attic. Rescuers had to cut a hole in the roof to get them out. In North Carolina, it is estimated that 16,000 homes were damaged or rendered uninhabitable. In the Greenville area over 1800 homes were made uninhabitable. The Carolinas AAA estimates 40,000 to 50,000 automobiles and other vehicles will have to be replaced due to flood damage. Currently, almost all of the people made homeless have found shelter elsewhere, many in mobile home and RV home units which have been brought in by State and FEMA officials.

The loss of life has been high but not as high as it would have been if it had not been for civilian and military rescue units. About 40 people are known dead. One perished near Greenville when he thought he could ford a flooded street only to find it was washed out by the creek that ran underneath. He and his car were swept away in the current.

Many farms and crops were ruined by the floodwaters leading to tremendous economic loss to farmers. The loss of domestic animals was horrific. Over 300,000 hogs and over two

million poultry died in the flood. Lagoons wherein animal waste is treated were flooded, washing enormous amounts of animal sewage into the floodwaters. All of this has been discharged into the shallow NC sounds. This waste will have prolonged environmental impact on these bodies of water. The water there does not all empty into the Atlantic Ocean but most evaporates.

Another horrible result of the flooding has been in cemeteries. Many coffins rose through the softened soil and floated away. So far, well over two hundred unearthened coffins have been found. Undoubtedly more that floated into the flooded forests will be found. Each of these must be identified. The remains in the coffins then have to be positively identified by forensic specialists and re-interred in new coffins.

The problems, which arose from the floods, were solved by the tremendous local and national relief efforts. North Carolina communities worked together to solve the problems. Many individuals who lost everything were at the forefront of the volunteer effort. Local businesses not immediately affected helped. Many firms distributed bottled water free.

Our local United Methodist retirement home, Cypress Glenn, was flooded in the lower floors of the buildings necessitating relocation of all of the residents to Crossdaile Village in Durham. Crossdaile Village is a new Methodist retirement community and had space in some of the unused portions of the new buildings. Cypress Glenn will need at least one-half million dollars worth of cleaning and repairs.

The rescue efforts of the National Guard and active military units were critical in many areas. Other State and National relief efforts, e.g. Federal Emergency Management Agency will be critical in meeting the needs of those who lost their homes, farms, and businesses. State and national funding at unprecedented levels will be necessary to rebuild the infrastructure and economy of eastern North Carolina.

Unfortunately, many of the persons suffering the greatest losses are people who cannot afford to rebuild. In addition, many were in areas in which flood insurance was not available as they were thought not to be in flood prone areas. I hope that FEMA and the cities will find a way to purchase homes in this new flood plain and rezone those areas to prevent the flooding from again threatening human habitations. Currently, homes, businesses, churches and other buildings that can be salvaged

and refurbished are being cleaned by residents and volunteers. These buildings must have the flood damaged floors taken up. All electrical devices and wiring wet by the floodwater must be removed. Walls must have all wet baseboard and drywall removed to a foot above the flood peak. All insulation must be removed. Then after all wood dries to less than 20% moisture content, everything must be sanitized and removed materials replaced. Flood wet air ducts must be cleaned and sanitized. New furnishings and appliances have to be purchased. It will be several years before all of these buildings are approved for habitation.

This has been a truly unfathomable act of nature. Only those who have lost all they have to the floods can know how devastating it has been - and the enormity of it really escapes the understanding of us all. It will be years before the fabric of civilization, the infrastructure, and the ecology of North Carolina will be repaired. Undoubtedly, the economy of the region will not only suffer but also will require considerable change from what it was before the summer of 1999. Eastern North Carolina will never be the same. We can only hope to rebuild this part of the State to be a better place with a stronger economy, and a new economic base.

How often do storms like this occur? This extent of the recent flooding in North Carolina has never been seen in the recorded history of the region. In our Archives database, Judson Fulghum recorded written accounts (that he found in ???) of great storms that occurred in Virginia during 1667:

"1667 - Storms, Rains, Hurricanes, hail - with stones as big as Turkey Eggs - and floods of great magnitude, wrecked countless homes and farms, played havoc with tobacco and grain crops and killed many cattle and hogs. Ten to fifteen thousand houses were blown down and at least 2/3 rds of the crops were destroyed."

Thus, it probably has happened before in North Carolina and undoubtedly will happen again. We must be ready! Other storm prone areas should take note - they, too, may suffer more severe storms than they have in the past.

After retiring from the U.S. Navy, Judson worked in the private sector. He worked for Combustion Engineering NATCO in Tulsa, Oklahoma, 1969 to 1972. In 1972, he went to work for TELEX Computer Products as a Systems Analyst in the Data Processing Department. He returned to NATCO in 1974 and was elevated to Director of Data Processing. He retired from NATCO in 1985. He was a private Consultant in Management Information Systems during his retirement.

Judson became involved in genealogy in the early 1980's. He researched the Fulghum and Dunnavant families, developing extensive family records from census and deed book records. Judson's work on the Fulgh-m family has corrected earlier mistakes and has extended greatly the family genealogical and historical database. His work is critical in understanding the relationships of the many Fulgh-m lineages. Judson has been the Fulgham-Fulghum Family National Association Associate Historian and ARCHIVIST since 1992. During this time, Judson rendered extraordinary service to FFFNA through his efforts in family genealogy and history, as well as through his service to individuals searching for their Fulgh-m lineages. He was active into late this summer, revising the family database and placing the data on ZIP diskettes for future study. FFFNA will have a difficult time finding a new Archivist to replace Judson.

Judson married Mary Francis Henson Wann on June 29, 1996. Jud moved to Columbia, South Carolina where he and Fran established their beautiful marriage and residence. Jud was delighted with his new life, new family to add to existing family, and beautiful weather for his love of playing golf. He was also pleased to be near his home of birth, Aiken, SC. They were visited frequently by his children and grandchildren who enjoyed seeing their daddy in his new setting.

Jud and Fran were members of Union United Methodist Church, Irmo, SC. He was very active serving on the finance committee, Living Christmas Story work team, usher, and an active participant of "The Joy Sunday School Class." One might say that Jud was a beautiful person with an enormous amount of love and dedication to give to the Fulghum heritage, Fulghum Archives, and his immediate family. Above all other missions, he had an emcee love for his Lord and Savior.

Fran writes, "Jud fought the battle of cancer that invaded his lungs and liver. During his illness, his everyday statement was, "God is in control, we will do what we can, but God is in control." Judson was a role model for all of us who knew him, teaching us how to live and teaching us how to die. Judson was laid to rest in Broken Arrow, Oklahoma. He is missed enormously. We grieve for his companionship but cherish him being with the Lord. One of the blessings of my life is being able to share three years as Jud's wife."
