We continue to receive requests for Fulgh-m lineages and are pleased to work up these requests and furnish them to inquirers at no cost.

I have learned that Judson Fulghum and his brother, James, several years ago transmitted about 6,500 names and lineages from the Fulghum-Fulghum database to the Family History Department of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (LDS) for inclusion in the LDS database. These names, etc. were ones, which Judson was very certain that were correct. there is a GEDCOM-Thus, (GEnealogical Data COMmunications) compatible version of much of our data. 
CAMPERS and RV's TRAVELERS Excellent facilities are available at LeFleur's Bluff State Park. Take I-55 north of downtown Jackson and exit right at Exit 98 B. Proceed to Lakeland Drive (Highway 25) go right (east) on Lakeland Drive to Lakeland Terrace, which is the entry street to the Campground. Turn right on Lakeland Terrace and proceed to the gatehouse. It would be prudent to call ahead for reservations: Office (601) 987-3923, Camping (601) 987-3985. Reserved camping is \$14 for the first night and \$12 for additional nights (No senior discount for reserved camping). Without reservations, senior citizen camping is \$9 per night.

GOLF COURSE LeFleur's Bluff State Park call (601) 362-3885. Entrance to the right off Lakeland Drive. See above.

AIR TRAVELERS The Edison Walthall Hotel is about 15 minutes from the airport. The Hotel provides a free shuttle to and from the airport. To obtain the shuttle service, one must inform the Hotel in advance of their desire to be picked up and of their airline, flight number and arrival time at the airport.

"HEALTHFUL" GENEALOGY

Foljambe Arms

A "Coat of Arms" is properly called an Achievement of Arms. It consists of a shield with insignia, a crest and, often, a motto. The term Coat of Arms comes from a surcoat with insignia that was worn over the armor to keep off the heat or cold. Heraldry (more properly, Armory) was established after mid 1150 to distinguish armored combatants in tournaments and during war. By 1350. English courts forbade the use Arms already adopted assigned to another nobleman. Eventually, the Crown in England forbade the bearing of Arms without authority. In England, Arms and armored insignia were granted only by the authority of the King of Arms. The official registers of the College of Arms, incorporated in March 1483, include Armorial Bearings granted from the 15th Century to today. Armigerious persons are those persons qualified to bear Arms. Note that there is no such thing as a "Family Coat of Arms," since authority to bear Arms was granted only to individuals. Arms may be inherited. To be entitled to Arms by inheritance one must be able to prove DIRECT, LEGITIMATE male line of descent from an ancestor entitled to the same Arms. Cadet branches of a family may inherit Arms in a modified version. Do Fulghams and Fulghums have a right to use the Foljambe Coat of Arms? The answer is, at the present, NO, not until the parentage of Captain Anthony Foljambe is documented.

Those Foljambes and their heirs entitled to Arms are found in "Burke's Landed Gentry" [1], which traces the lineage of the main lines of Foljambes entitled to the Arms. The Foljambe Arms are described in several publications [1,2,3]. The Arms of Foljambe of Osberton are: Sable (black) a bend between six escallops or (gold). Crest - a jambe (leg) unarmed and spurred quarterly or and sable. The motto is Soyez Ferme (Be steadfast or Be firm). The arms for Foljambe of Osberton are depicted in "Burke's Landed Gentry"

[1]. The description of Arms for Foljambe of Walton is essentially the same except the bend is specified as or (gold) [4].

Escallops (scallops) are one of the most widely used symbols in heraldry. The escallop is a shellfish of the Genus Pecten, and is represented in heraldry by its shell. In heraldry, the scallop shell is a symbol of travel. It is the insignia of St. James of Compostela, the Patron Saint of Travel [4]. Santiago de Compostela, in Spain, is the reputed site of the tomb of the Apostle, St. James. A pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela, undertaken as an act of penance or devotion, earned the pilgrim the opportunity to purchase and bear the Saint's emblem, a shell [5]. DeFoleschampes from Normandy made the pilgrimage and earned the scallops.

The scallop shell also was the badge of the pilgrim crusaders. Its use on Arms could signify one or more ancestors went on Crusades [6]. Peter C. Fulghum writes, "He (our Dad, James Hooks Fulghum) told me the shells represented the Crusade of St. James which was defeated on the beaches. He also said the bend included twelve Maltese crosses but did not know why (possibly arms of a cadet branch? Or the present Arms were the Arms of a cadet branch of the above?)."

There were eight major Crusades and many interspersed minor campaigns. We are not sure to which of the Crusades our father referred. Possibly, Foljambes went with preachers, Peter the Hermit and Walter the Penniless, who organized one of the early bands of crusaders of the First (The Peoples) Crusade. This band was ambushed and all but annihilated by the Turks after being ferried across the straits from Constantinople in August of 1096. Richard, the Lionhearted and his knights were major forces in the Third Crusade in 1191-92. All of the other Crusades were mainly French and German, although Richard of Cornwall participated in 1239 and Prince Edward of England went to North Africa as a part of a minor crusade in 1271-72. Other ill-starred expeditions continued to be launched after the Eighth Crusade (1271) even into the Fifteenth Century. [7]. Most of the Crusades were failures.

Another interesting item found while researching Foljambe Arms was that the Calopus or Chatloup (probably a "cat-wolf" with horns) was at one time a badge of the Foljambe family [8]. This imaginary creature was a curious horned animal difficult to describe.

Hercules Foljambe - Elizabethan Privateer

Who was the Elizabethan privateer, Hercules Foljambe, that somewhat mysterious purported ancestor of the Fulgham/Fulghum family in North America? Is it plausible that he was our ancestor? All of the "official" Foljambe pedigrees that include Hercules show him to have died without issue. Yet the Bishop's transcripts of Saint James Church in Clerkenwell, London, show him to have christened a daughter, Odelia, on February 18, 1597 [1]. He was married four times but none of the pedigrees document all of his marriages. He certainly died in straitened financial circumstances and no evidence of a will has been found in the published sources. He lived to a grand old age for the seventeenth century, 82 years, and his claim to fame was that of a gambler, a risk taker, and a warrior with a hot temper. He wagered his entire estate, his birthright, on a single privateering venture with George Clifford, the Earl of Cumberland ... and lost it all. Gentry family histories tend to be unkind to family members who lost their estates, for it was their fundamental responsibility to preserve the family estates at all costs. So we are faced with an ambiguous and sparse record of Hercules. There are several theories concerning our English origins, e.g., the Lincolnshire origin, London origin, Somerset origin, and more. The Hercules Foljambe theory is only one promising origin theory. The purpose of this article is to provide insight into Hercules' life and potentially spark some interest in our readers to pursue further study of Hercules and uncover new information.

Hercules Foljambe was born circa 1550 the son of Godfrey of Plumley and Elizabeth Draycott Foljambe, daughter of Philip Draycott [2]. Hercules grew up at Plumley and not Moor Hall ... the family did not acquire Moor Hall until 1573. Since Hercules was a younger son, having an older brother Godfrey, who would be the family heir, he followed the custom of the time and dedicated himself to soldiering. In a letter to King James ca. 1608, Hercules stated that "... for 40 years he had been employed in the Netherlands, in the field and at sea ..."[3]. This would place him in the military in 1568 at age 18. Hercules would have deployed many times to the "Low Countries" (Netherlands) over the succeeding decades with the Derbyshire trained bands when their arms were needed in the war with the French and Spaniards. In 1586, the Earl of Shrewsbury corresponded with John Manners, Deputy Lieutenant of Derbyshire, for the appointment of Hercules Foljambe as Captain of the trained band [4]. On Tuesday night November 15, 1591 a messenger named Leonard Frost summoned Hercules from Fairburn in the parish of Ledsham West Yorkshire, 2-1/4 miles from Ferrybridge, to Moor hall in Derbyshire [5]. His elder brother, Godfrey, had died and Hercules was his heir. Finally, at age 41 Hercules had an estate. Within the next few months exciting news of the Earl of Cumberland's capture of the Spanish treasure ship, the Madre de Dios, riveted England. Vast riches, said to exceed 500,000 pounds in value, flooded the country's markets from the ship's cargo. Hercules observed this windfall with an adventurer's interest. The outline of a future plan began to form in his mind.

In 1593, Hercules leased Moor Hall to Richard Grynne for 50Lbs/Yr and moved to London [5]. Although he appears previously to have married Sarah, daughter of John Hardwick of Hardwick (Colin Foljambe wrote the author that Hercules divorced her for adultery) and Anne (last name not known) [2], the Bishops Transcripts for St. Bride's Church Fleet Street, London tell us that he married Elizabeth Barker on February 25, 1595. [1] Also in 1595, Hercules' distant cousin and the head of the senior branch of the Foljambe family, Sir Godfrey of Walton, died naming Hercules as one of his heirs (See Family Facts No. 30, August, 1999 for details). The London of 1595 was teeming with merchant adventurers and would-be privateers ... Elizabeth I had opened the door to legalized privateering in her undeclared war with Spain by issuing "Letters of Marque" to vessel captains which protected them from being charged with piracy. English gentry were encouraged to take part in privateering expeditions for Queen and country. Many of these expeditions were joint stock ventures where those investing their resources shared in any "plunder" taken during the voyage. Given this as background, we can see that London gentlemen of the time, those who had ready resources for investment, and especially those with a military and seafaring background, were barraged with proposals to invest purse and person in privateering ventures. This was the London of 1597 when George Clifford, Earl of Cumberland, approached Hercules Foljambe with just such a proposal.



- OSBERTON HALL, Nottingham, c. 1784 to the present. Lord of the manor, Michael Foljambe will greet you for a days visit, were you will view documents and a collection of priceless artworks.
- CHESTERFIELD PARISH CHURCH, Derbyshire. Where you will view elaborate Foljambe tombs. The Processional Cross was recently restored by the American Fulgham family.
- ALL SAINT'S CHURCH, Bakewell, Derbyshire. See the c. 1377 monument to Sir Godfrey Foljame and his wife Avena, is considered one of the finest in England.



John Folyambe, c. 1358 Cathedral of the Peak




