## In Memoriam

### Elizabeth Fulghum (Libba) King

Eva Elizabeth Fulghum (Libba) King of Wilson, North Carolina, died Wednesday, January 25, 2002 at Pitt County Memorial Hospital, University Health Systems of Eastern Carolina in Greenville, NC.

She was born 15 October 1917 and was the daughter of the late Edwin Clark and Eva Earle Fulghum.

Libba was an active member of the FFFNA and had served on the planning Committee for two FFFNA national reunions. She was a member of the National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century and was a collector of information on her extended family.

Libba was a dedicated worker in her church, St. Timothy's Episcopal, and in her community and state. She had been recognized as an award winning volunteer at both the state and local level. Among her many volunteer activities, she was one of the founders of the Wilson Crisis Center, a result of her extensive efforts on behalf of the emotionally ill.

She was preceded in death by her husband, W. Johnston King, and her daughter Elizabeth King Hinson Mercer, and is survived by her son, W. Johnston King III, his wife, Katie, a sister, Dorothy Fulghum Rose of Fern Park, Florida, and three grandchildren.

Libba is descended down the John, Jacob, Jesse, and Gary Fulghum line from Anthony and Nancy Raiford Fulghum who migrated from Virginia to North Carolina in 1735.

**Ima Eula Mewborn** of Farmville, NC died 5 February 2002. She was born 30 May 1912 in Greene County, NC. Miss Mewborn was a member of numerous genealogical and historical societies. Ima, along with her sister, Ailine, was a dedicated genealogist who studied many North Carolina families.

## WAVERLY

### PART ONE

Growing up on a small cotton farm in the Deep South is, I believe, after having reviewed our Fulgh\*m family database in-depth over the past year, an experience shared by many of us. I recently read John Grisham's quasi-autobiographical novel *A Painted House* about seven-year-old Luke Chandler's experiences on an 80-acre farm in Arkansas in 1952. With few exceptions, young Luke's life on the farm mirrored my own. The book evoked the universal experiences of small cotton farm life in the Deep South quite effectively. When our Newsletter Editor, Robert S. Fulghum, asked me to dust off an article that I had written in 1988 about a family legend related to a place called "Waverly" in Mississippi, and to prepare it for serialized publication in the Newsletter, I thought of the underlying theme of *A Painted House*. The book is about family and the article "Waverly" is about family. My ggggg-grandmother, Nancy Hampton Young, is buried in the family graveyard at Waverly. But let me not get ahead of myself for when this story began I had not yet learned that there was a place named Waverly nor did I know of Nancy Hampton Young.

When I was young Luke's age, spending long monotonous hours on the cotton rows, my escape was often to reflect on family legends and to wonder about the possibilities in such legends for my deliverance. In *A Painted House*, the cotton field is ever present and waiting, like a draconian spirit, to shackle young Luke in its bonds of monotony. Luke sought his deliverance as I suspect many of us did, through daydreams. The Waverly legend made a very good escape from the monotony of the cotton field. If it had been only a legend it would now have been long forgotten. Luckily, when I was in my thirties I became interested in my family's history and researched the details that I could remember from the legend. The following story comes, in part, from the Civil War remembrances of my Great Grandmother, Alice Haley Burton, which she told to my father as a small boy and is confirmed by research.

The Waverly legend centered on West Point, Mississippi, during the Civil War and involved true love, the ravages of war, lost fortunes, and buried gold that has never been recovered. Young Alice grew up in West Point living near two very old and very bellicose great-uncles. These men had come to Mississippi long before she was born and built a log cabin and lived together in it while they built up large plantations. One of the great-uncles later built "... the biggest house in that whole country..." according to Alice, and ostensibly owned more land than any planter in the country. Alice remembered that her father came to West Point to help build the big house and married the woman who was later to become her mother, and who was also the big house owner's niece. During the Civil War, Alice recalled being at parties at the big house where high-ranking Confederate officers were in attendance, but she was too young to know who they were. Near the end of the war, she recalled one of her great-uncles proclaimed "...they will never find my yellow boys..." as he called his gold coins. She remembered that he died soon after the end of the war without telling where the gold was buried. Reconstruction was hard on the family and Alice recollected that her mother, who had never cooked or performed housework before the war, was such a dreadful cook that Alice became the principal cook for the family. Before Alice died in 1939 she told my father that she thought the big house was still standing. Such was the original legend as told by Alice and passed on by my father. The following is the result of my genealogical research related to the Waverly legend. To give the reader a view of the similar emigration patterns of both sides of the family, it follows my father's side of the family in parallel with Alice's side of the family, from the Revolutionary War period, through the period of the legend and up through her telling of it.

John Fulgham, my gggg-grandfather, was born at Blackwater, Isle of Wight County, Virginia, in 1770. Within two years of his birth, in 1772, after his father, also named John Fulgham, received a 400 acre royal grant from Governor Montagu, his family moved to a new "seat" in Old Craven (later Fairfield) County, South Carolina, on Thorntree Creek near Winnsboro<sup>1</sup>. The area was being settled heavily by Virginians and became known as the "Virginia Colony".

**G**EORGE the Third by the Grace of God, of GREAT-BRITAIN, FRANCE and IRELAND, KING, Defender of the Faith, and so forth, To ALL to whom THESE PRESENTS shall come GREETING: KNOW YE, THAT WE of our special Grace, certain Knowledge and mere Motion, have given and granted, and by these Presents, for us, our heirs and successors, DO GIVE AND GRANT unto

*John Fulgham his*  
 heirs and assigns, a plantation or tract of land containing *four hundred acres (more or less)*  
 for him *the* *November 1772* situated in *Charleston* County on the *West*  
*side* of *Water* River, and on both sides *Thorn tree* Creek, on the  
*South* bounded to the *North East* and *West* by *Doctor Robertson's*  
*land* East by *John Morrison's* land North West by *John Wilson's*  
*land* and on all other sides by *a canal* *Land*.  
 And hath such shape, form and marks, as appear by a plat thereof, hereunto annexed: Together with all

Given under the Great Seal of our said Province.  
 WITNESS His Excellency *the* *Resident* *Gov. John*  
*Montagu* *Capt. Genl.*  
 Governor and Commander in chief in and over our said Province of South Carolina, this  
*Sixteenth* day of *June*  
 Anno Dom. 1772 in the *Third* Year of our Reign.

The Virginians chafed at the restrictive British settlement policies and sided with the colonial forces during the Revolution. John Fulgham provided supplies to the Continental Army in 1781 during the campaign in South Carolina that culminated in the Battle of Cowpens.

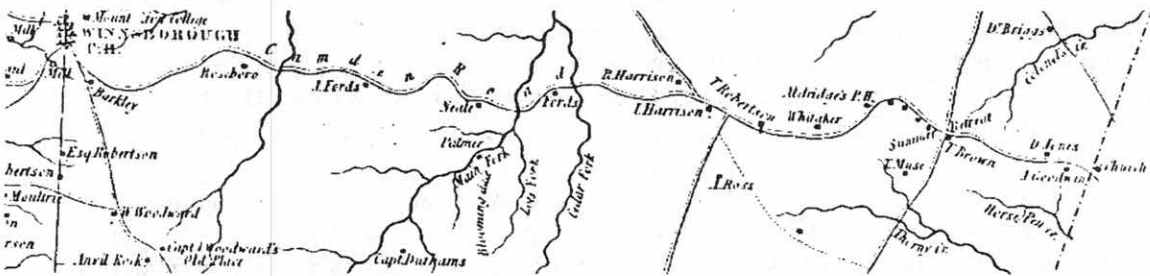


Figure 2. Location of John Fulgham's Thorntree Creek property near Winnsboro, S.C. (Note: "Thorny Cr."). From Mills Atlas, 1825.

During this period, John's family had grown to four sons ... Micajah, the eldest, followed by John, Henry, and Jesse. By 1789, he had been at his Thorntree Creek holdings for 17 years when new lands were opening up on the upper Savannah River in Georgia. Many Virginians were making the move to the Savannah River and in 1789 John made the move, patenting land in Burke County near Waynesboro. Georgia Bounty Grant records show that the following Fulghams moved to Georgia in the late 1700's:

Another Virginian, George Young, and his wife, Nancy Hampton Young, of Halifax County, Virginia, made the move to the upper Savannah at this time and settled north of Petersburg in Elbert County. This was a turning point in the economic

history of the south brought on by a new invention, the cotton gin, invented by Eli Whitney. George Young adapted quickly to the new economy and, by 1825, had accumulated extensive land in Elbert and Oglethorpe Counties. He built a three-story colonial home with six columns in Lexington, Georgia, which still stands today and is known as the "Brooks House."<sup>2</sup>

John Fulgham acquired land in Montgomery County, Georgia and he died in 1801 leaving his heirs a moderate amount of property. His son, Henry, became a Georgia legislator and Montgomery County Sheriff before moving to Lawrence County, Mississippi, near the Pearl River in 1817, and later to Copiah County<sup>3</sup>. Micajah became a respected Baptist minister at the Richland Baptist Church near Jeffersonville, Twiggs County, Georgia, where he is mentioned on an historical marker, that still stands today, near the church site.<sup>4</sup> By 1820 Micajah had also moved to Lawrence County, Mississippi. Jesse had continued to farm the Thorntree Creek holdings in South Carolina after the rest of the family moved on to Georgia. John, the younger, moved several times ... from Burke County, Georgia, to Lancaster County, South Carolina, to Lincoln County, Tennessee ... before finally settling down in Bibb County, Alabama, on the Cahaba River near Centreville in 1835. Although the name of John's first wife is unknown, before 1820 he had taken a South Carolina wife, Sarah Smitherman, and started a new family.
