RICHARD FOLJAMBE “OF DARLEY” (ca. 1347-ca. 1389)

The 7G GRANDFATHER OF CAPTAIN ANTHONY FULGHAM by Historian Grant Fulgham

(continued from Summer 2021 Issue 98)

MILITARY SERVICE & CAREER – Previous sections of this work discussed Richard’s childhood, young adulthood, marriage and young fatherhood. He lived during troubled times for the entire Foljambe family; his father was a high crown official in the king’s trust in wartime, the family was of the landed gentry and had significant wartime feudal duties to fulfill. The following Hundred Years’ War chart shows Foljambe family members’ fulfillment of military service, an important feudal duty, and their kinship to our ancestor, Richard of Darley. The data for this chart is derived from the searchable database created by researchers at the University of Southampton in England and entered on-line. The raw data came from their research of legal agreements such as letters of protection and letters of attorney entered into by some of the soldiers before they left for war, and enlistment rolls such as muster rolls or retinue rolls which indicated that they reported for duty and were paid. The 100 Years’ War had begun a generation before the earliest date of service indicated in the chart, a period later identified as the “Edwardian Phase (1337-60)” of the war dominated by the English side and which left France in a shambles. Peace reigned for several years leading up to the date of 1369, which marked the declaration of war on England by French King Charles V, commencing the “Caroline Phase (1369-89)” of the 100 Years’ War. Each of our family members in this chart has a story but there is insufficient space here to tell all of their stories. With the kind readers’ permission, your humble author will pick out the cases that appear the most compelling and prepare a brief paragraph for only those cases.

Beginning in 1369 Sir Godfrey Foljambe, Sr. and his eldest son, Sir Godfrey, Jr. were registered men at arms with John of Gaunt, 1st Duke of Lancaster (2nd creation). Gaunt served as their Captain for the duration of the “Expedition France”. He had been appointed by King Edward III to be the supreme military commander of all English forces fielded to answer the declaration of war issued by France’s King Charles V. England’s military strategy had been from the beginning of the 100 Years’ War, and continued now in the Caroline Phase, to fight by “chevauchee”, i.e., fast-moving cross-country raids to draw the enemy from its fortifications for face to face battle. The English generally did not stop and lay siege to fortified towns. The English Navy transported invasion forces and materiel and debarked them at the invasion ports. Subsequently, the Navy might follow the coast and disembark raiding parties near opportune coastal towns and provide support to the inland chevauchee. Sir Godfrey, Sr. served as one of Gaunt’s closest counselors. A future Newsletter issue will provide his biography, including his service during the Expedition France.

Richard of Darley’s elder brother, Sir Godfrey Foljambe, Jr., aged about 26 years in 1369, knighted and married a few years previously, reported for duty with his father under Gaunt at Gaunt’s wartime center of operational planning, Savoy Palace (seen at right), Liberty of the Savoy, Middlesex. Since Sir Godfrey Jr.’s father was a close counselor to Gaunt, it is inferred that Godfrey Jr.’s military activities were in support of his father’s role, under Gaunt, of perhaps acquisition planning for personnel, armament and logistics affecting both naval and army operations. It is believed that his father up to his death managed Sir Godfrey, Jr.’s

military activities. In July 1369, Godfrey Sr. and Jr. accompanied Gaunt on his opening thrust into northern France in what turned into an abbreviated chevauchee due to the Duke of Burgundy’s large blocking force unexpectedly positioned across a marsh there. The standoff lasted for several weeks until the Earl of Warwick reinforced Gaunt and the Duke of Burgundy withdrew. With Warwick’s reinforcements, Gaunt then marched on Harfleur, the main French naval base on the Seine, with the objective of laying siege to the fortified town. He invested the town for less than a week in October and was losing a significant percentage of the personnel in his fighting forces, one of who was the Earl of Warwick, to dysentery and bubonic plague. Knowing that discretion is the better part of valor, and he still needed a viable fighting force for his return through enemy territory to Calais, Gaunt lifted the siege and successfully returned to the safety of Calais and then England. Although he had taken a walk on thin ice in committing English forces to a siege, his audacious raid into northern France and the attack on France’s primary naval base on the Seine, forced Charles V to abandon plans for an invasion of England that fall.^{10, 2}

2021 FFNFF HISTORIAN & ARCHIVIST SUMMARY

1. Review of Accomplishments in the Year 2020:

OUR ANCESTRAL MIGRATIONS – Based on continued research into the activities of our direct ancestors in England from the 13th through the 17th centuries, clarity continues to build that our American family line departed from the authority of the senior line in the area of Elton, Derbyshire in the 14th century and then migrated via Nottinghamshire to Reepham and Hemswell, Lincolnshire for a generation, then to Inge’s Manor, Hertfordshire for three generations, then to Somersetshire for four generations and then to America. The FFNFF Historian has provided FFNFF Newsletter articles on the first immigrant to America (Issues #76 & #78). Additionally, articles have been provided which step us backward in time, generation to generation from the first Foljambe/Fulgham immigrant to his 7 G-Grandfather, Richard, the 3rd son of Sir Godfrey Foljambe (1316-76). The FFNFF Historian is currently researching available sources for the preparation of an article for a future Newsletter issue on the 8G-Grandfather, Sir Godfrey Foljambe.

THE FULJAMES CONNECTION – The year 2020 saw continuing research on our connection with the Somersetshire Fuljames family, specifically through the line of Anthony Fulgham/Fuljames' father, John. We have found that the Sir John Cotton, Knt., of Silverton, Devons. who married Sarah Fuljames (Anthony's sister), descends from the Cotton family of Hamstall Ridware, Staffordshire. In 1428 a William of this line was born in Conington, Huntingdonshire and married in 1441 to a Mary Folville, granddaughter of Agnes de Brus, a direct descendant of the Brus (Bruce) scot lords of Conington, Huntingdonshire. Work on the Fuljames connection has continued into 2021.

Fulghum** (1870-1951), **Oscar Norwood Fulghum** (1879-1971), **William (Bill) Enoch Fulghum** (1868-1946), **Joseph Carlos Fulghum** (1872-1943), and **Ethan Marion Fulghum** (1882-1950). Not pictured are **Jesse A. Fulghum** (1875-1892), and **Toby Fulghum** (1887-1888). Joseph Harrison Fulghum is featured in Issue 53 Meet My Family Group, Part 6 by Jimmy Fulghum Mills. He is also mentioned in articles on his father John Glen Fulghum, page 67, and his grandfather Matthew Fulghum, page 73, in the Fulgham-Fulghum-Foljambe Family History book. Joseph was born in Washington County, Georgia, near the small town of Warthen, lived in Higgston, GA and is buried Oak Chapel Baptist Cemetery in Dellwood, Emanuel County, Georgia, near Swainsboro. Joseph was a Private and then a Full Ordnance sergeant in the Confederate States Army. Many thanks to Ethan's great grandchildren Glenn Fulghum, Marion F. Winter, and Frances F. Bailey in the Augusta, GA area for this picture. His house in Higgston, GA, although abandoned, is still standing per Carolyn Allwine, descendant of John. Reunions

The North America beginning of our family was in ISLE OF WIGHT County, Virginia in ca. 1640. Now we have reunions in many states. Of the 30 national reunions, the Association held the first in 1985 in Rock Ridge, NC. The last ten gatherings have been held 2006 in Nacogdoches, Texas; 2007 in Williamsburg, VA; 2008 in Raleigh, NC; 2009 at Smith Mountain Lake (Wirtz, VA); 2013 on St. Simon's Island, GA.; 2014 in Callaway Gardens; 2015 in Asheville, , NC, 2016 in Winston-Salem, NC. , and 2017 in Greenville, North Carolina. In 2017 the National Association voted to combine with the Foundation. The official name is the Fulgham-Fulghum National Family Foundation. The Foundation met in August 2018 in Richmond, VA .and in August 2019 in Raleigh, NC. Due to Covid 19 constraints in August 2020 and 2021 the Foundation met via Zoom.
